STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT RESULTS TO BE PROUD OF.....



- Six Year Graduation Rate inclusive of Evergreen and exclusive of one year visiting International students is 96.5%
- The Aboriginal Graduation Rate is now at 84.4% as compared to the provincial average of 70.7%

- Many Fine Arts performances due to the COVID-19 pandemic, musical, drama and artistic performances were reimagined and livestreamed.

Students in Ali Young's Grade 8 Art class at École Dr Knox Middle School were challenged with a personal inquiry tackling current social issues. 
- Celebrated the graduations for students from the SD23/BCIT Dual Credit Program and Okanagan College Gateway Program.

- Due to the passing of Trustee Rolli Cacchioni, a by-election was held
- A Parent Information Night was held for Grade 6 Late Entry French Immersion Program
- Discontinued the offering of Grade 4 middle entry French Immersion Program at Hudson Road Elementary after the 2021/2022 school year due to limited demand
- Sent 5 letters advocating on behalf of public education
- During Public Meetings, the Board recognized:
 - 11 students/teams for achievements and awards
 - 3 teachers and support staff for special accomplishments
- Dissolved Board Standing Committee Human Resources and Staff Services Committee



EVENTS TO BE PROUD OF.....



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual Recognition Reception for Years of Service & New Employees, as well as the annual Retirement Dinner, were not held.

New staff received a video welcoming them to the District.

The long-service recognition of 3 employees for 35 years, 52 employees for 30 years of service and 66 employees for 20 years of service was acknowledged by providing each employee with a Certificate and pin. A video was also created honouring their recognition.

Health and Safety

- Our Health and Safety Department managed claims for 31 School Districts in the Province
- Revenue totaling \$312,981 is obtained through three sources:
 - 1. Claims Management Shared Services net \$142,837
 - 2. Online Safety Courses net \$20,510
 - 3. COR Safety Audit net \$149,634

International Education

 The International Education Program generated net revenues for the District in excess of \$2.1M this year with 350 students (233.6 FTE) coming from 22 countries and jurisdictions.



MANAGING THE VOLUME OF CHANGE WITHIN THE SYSTEM.....



- The Human Resources Department processed (as of June 15th):
 - 327 support staff postings
 - 263 teacher postings during the Spring staffing period
 - 54 Senior staff, Principal, Vice-Principal and management changes (retirements, resignations, appointments and reassignments)
 - 212 new Teachers Teaching on Call (TTOC) hired
- During the 2020/2021 school year, the Board concluded the selection process for the following senior staff and management positions:
