SCHOOL DISTRICT FACILITY PLAN: Provincial Requirements

A School District Facility Plan is a Ministry of Education capital plan requirement and must include:

- Long-term role of each school;
- Enrolment forecasts and capacity utilization analysis in the context of surrounding area schools, and the District as a whole;
- Options for potential reconfiguration of District Programs to optimize school capacity and utilization;
- Area requirements for each facility using Ministry of Education standards;
- Where required, area requirements for existing or new sites based upon school capacity and expectations for future expansion.

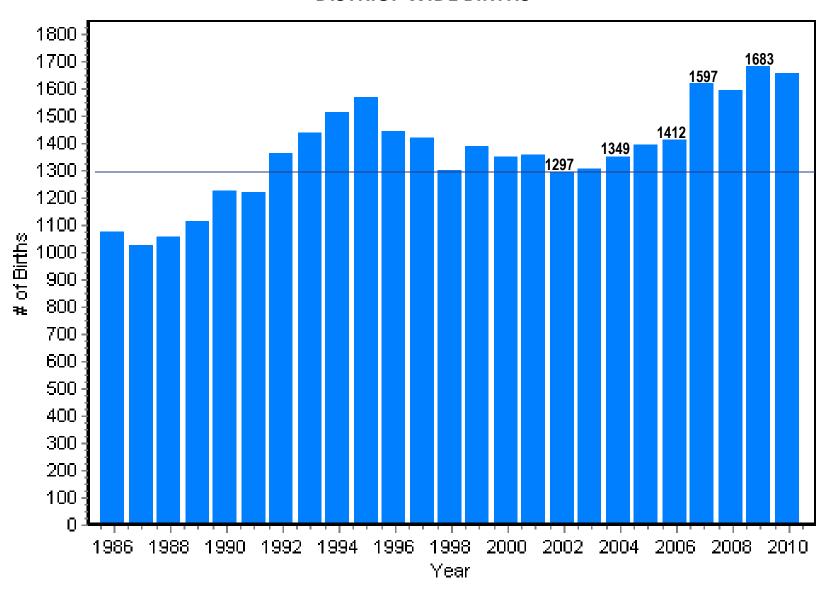


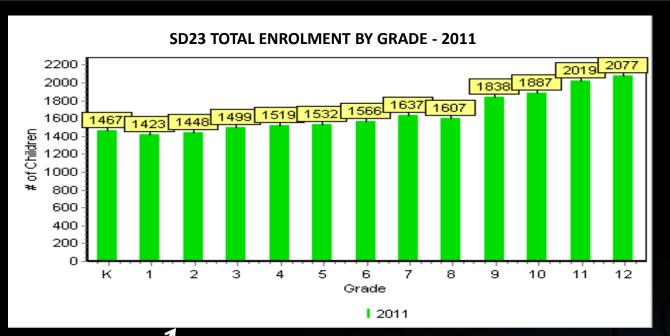

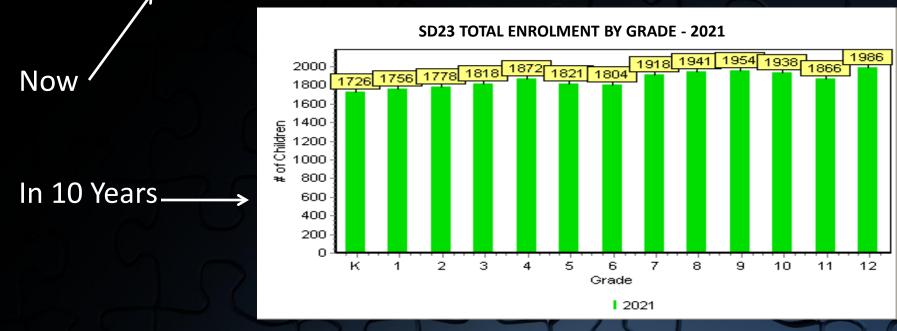

By 2021:

Elementary (K-6)

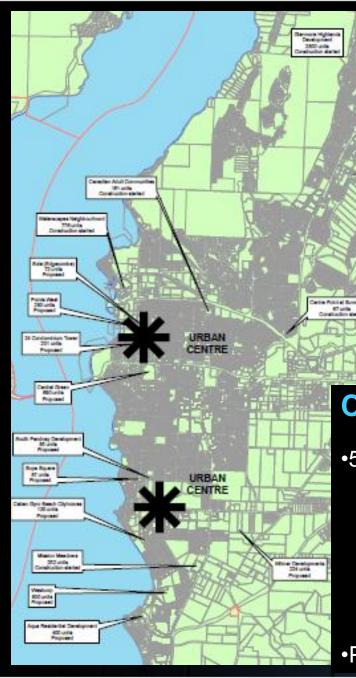
- •Will begin to increase rapidly starting in 2012 driven by birth rate
- •Will be approx. 2,200 students higher by 2021

Middle (7-9)

•Will grow approx. 300 to 350 students but increase will not begin until 2018 or 2019

Secondary

- •Will decline until 2015, with 400 fewer students
- •By 2021 will increase to 100 under current 2011 enrolment

- •10,124 new residential units in 20 years
- •68% Single Family
- •32% Multi Family
- Estimated Student Yield: 2,450

Central Area: (Glenmore, Downtown & South Pandosy)

- •5,680 new residential units in 20 years
 - •Glenmore & Dilworth 2,000 Single Family Units & 1,200 Multi Family Units
 - •Bankhead 160 Multi Family Units
 - •Downtown 2,020 Multi Family Units
 - •South Pandosy & Gyro Beach 300 Multi Family Units
- Potential Student Yield: 900K to Gr 12 students

KSS Projections may be low. KSS retention rate has climbed significantly since the introduction of a semester timetable. The full extent of this is not known.

CENTRAL KELOWNA: MOVING FORWARD CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

OBSERVATIONS: Elementary Schools:

- Over Capacity at specific elementary schools;
 - Casorso & Glenmore due to popularity of French Immersion
 - Watson Rd. due to the birth rate and new development
- Largest growth continues in the Glenmore area
- The District currently has two site options for new schools;
 - Wilden Subdivision and the Old Dr. Knox site by the Apple Bowl
- French Immersion Programs continue to be extremely popular & growing
- The open boundary for AS Matheson, Raymer & Casorso requires review
- Central Kelowna is well serviced by Early Learning Programs in areas where vulnerable children have been identified

Facility Condition Issues:

• Glenmore & Raymer Elementary require upgrading or replacement

CENTRAL KELOWNA: MOVING FORWARD CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

OBSERVATIONS: Middle Schools:

- Central Kelowna students have access to middle school opportunities
- KLO Middle is over capacity with 7 portables and 124% utilization
- KLO Middle site will not support many more portable classrooms
- If KLO Regular Program students need to be redirected due to space shortage, the closest middle school is considerable distance away
- If KLO French Immersion students need to be redirected due to space shortage, there is no other option
- Many French Immersion students from outlying areas have long distances to travel for middle immersion

Facility Condition Issues:

KLO Middle will require upgrading in the future

CENTRAL KELOWNA: MOVING FORWARD CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

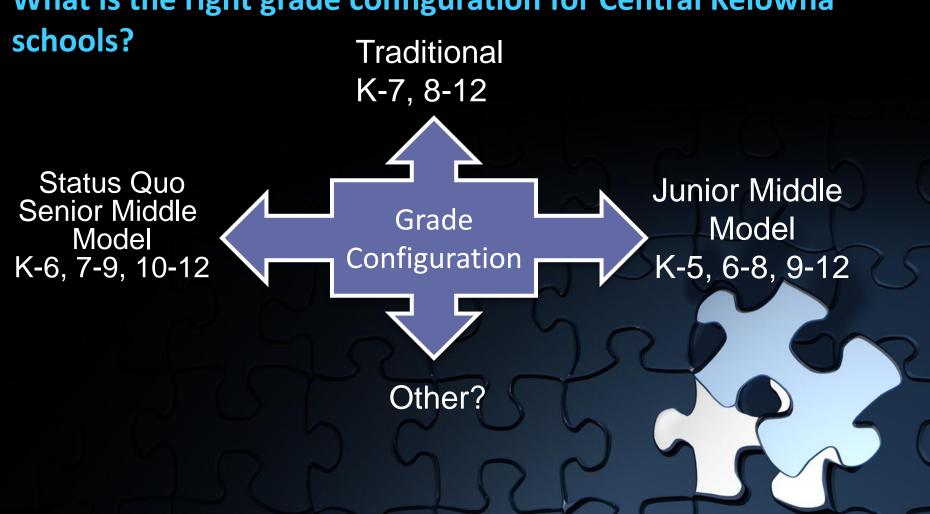
OBSERVATIONS: Secondary School:

- KSS over capacity with 8 portables, but student enrolments may decline slightly over the coming years
- It will be difficult to accommodate additional portables without significant financial commitment
- Numerous Specialty programs at KSS
- New secondary school eventually required north of Hwy 97
- Site Options: Old Dr. Knox Middle or new site

Facility Condition Issues at KSS: None

CENTRAL KELOWNA: MOVING FORWARD ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS

2. How to manage the growth in the Central Kelowna Area?

Options:

- a. Revise elementary catchment areas to distribute the population more evenly
- b. Place portables at elementary schools
 - -With a long-term plan of a new elementary school
- c. Place portables at elementary schools
 - -With a long-term plan of constructing additions at 2 or 3 existing schools
- d. Place portables at elementary schools
 - -with a long-term plan to revise grade configurations to a Junior Middle Model
 - K-5, Gr 6-8, Gr 9-12 and;
 - Construct new senior secondary school space in north end of Kelowna (Min. 700 students; 500 Grade 9's plus approx. 200 over capacity)
- e. Revise middle catchment areas to distribute the population more evenly
- f. Create middle French Immersion Programs in outlying areas
- g. Construct an addition to KLO Middle

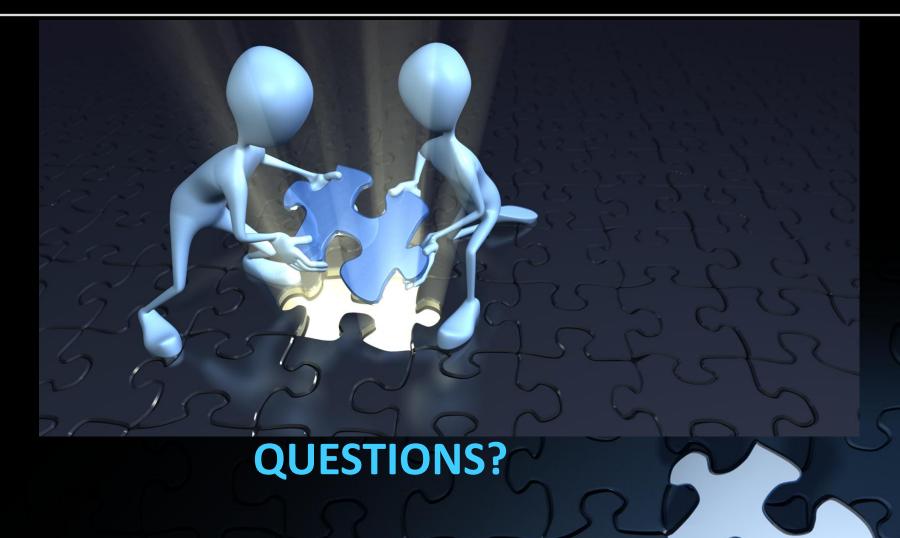
