Justin Kulik presented on the petition he spearheaded to end food waste in Canada. Action Item: Naming of the New Middle School in Lake Country

1.0 ISSUE STATEMENT

Central Okanagan Public Schools is in the preliminary design phase for the Lake Country Middle School. The funding for this new facility has been approved and construction is scheduled to begin in the Spring. Establishing the name of the new school as early as possible helps to build a sense of identity and a sense of community while it is under construction. In addition, choosing a permanent name earlier rather than later will help ensure that the project drawings and specifications actually have the "correct" name on them.

2.0 RELEVANT BOARD MOTION/DIRECTION

18P-045 April 11, 2018

THAT: The Board of Education direct staff to bring back to the May 9, 2018 Public Board Meeting the comprehensive process by which public input will be solicited from the residents of the attendance area, and the community, regarding naming of the new Lake Country Middle School, pursuant to Board Policy 630 - "Dedication and Naming of Schools and Facilities".

THAT: The Board of Education receives the comprehensive process for the Naming of the Lake Country Middle School as presented at the May 9, 2018 Public Board Meeting.

3.0 BACKGROUND

SEPTEMBER 2018:

The Principals of George Elliot Secondary School, Oyama Traditional School, Davidson Road Elementary School and École Peter Greer Elementary School, sought suggested names for the Lake Country Middle School from students, staff and parents of their school communities.

Name submissions (written or submitted through online survey process) were encouraged through announcement reminders, newsletters, School Connects, and/or the school websites, and collected at the school office. Submissions were collected during the first three weeks of school and submitted to the school Parent Advisory Council (PAC) for review at the September PAC meeting and then provided to the Assistant Superintendent of Lake Country Schools. PACs were also invited to submit, in addition to those submitted, an "official" recommendation.

The larger community was invited to put forward suggested names for the new Lake Country Middle School through an online survey. The survey link was posted on the School District website, as well as the District of Lake Country's website. The link was active from September 10 to 28, 2018. This was advertised through a local media release.

The District of Lake Country was also approached for a list of recognized Lake Country Neighbourhood Associations. Associations were contacted and were asked to provide the people they represent with the online survey link. In addition, the District was invited to solicit an "official" recommendation, if any, from government and the Neighbourhood Associations.

OCTOBER 2018:

Results from School Community Consultation, as well as the online survey, were collated, synthesized and submitted to the October 17, 2018 Planning and Facilities Committee Meeting.

During the meeting, the Director of Operations referenced the results of the survey regarding naming the new middle school in the Lake Country Area, which is set to open in September 2021. Supporting documentation for the for Eijiro Koyama name submission was provided and a representative from the Heritage Museum spoke to this submission.

A strong response to the survey, including submissions from students, parents and the community at large, was received with hundreds of suggestions being put forward.

The Committee reviewed the suggestions and provided feedback.

The Committee recommended that three names (Eijiro Koyama Middle School, Hank Grenda Middle School and Aspen Grove Middle School) be presented at the November 14, 2018, Public Board Meeting for consideration and decision by the Board.

NOVEMBER 2018:

Due to a community request to present at the November 21, 2018, Public Planning and Facilities Committee, the Coordinating Committee referred this action item to the December 12, 2018, Public Board Meeting for consideration and decision by the Board.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

In total 318 name submissions were collected, and are included in Appendix B. The following patterns and trends emerged from an analysis of the results:

630 – DEDICATION AND NAMING OF SCHOOLS AND FACILITIES

Introduction

The Board of Education acknowledges the importance of naming and dedication of schools and facilities to enhance the sense of ownership and identification the community has with its school.

Policy

Naming of Schools 1.

- Recommendations regarding the naming of new facilities or the renaming of existing schools/sections of schools will be received and considered by the Planning and Facilities Committee.
- The Planning and Facilities Committee will recommend a name to the Board for approval.

Dedication of Schools and District Facilities 2.

- 2.1 When new permanent school district facilities are built, an official public dedication ceremony shall be held.
- As time can elapse between the awarding of a construction contract and the official opening of a district school facility, the trustees' names inscribed on the plaque shall be those in office when the construction contract was awarded. The date shall be the year of completing the construction.
- The official public dedication ceremony for each new permanent school facility shall follow the Guidelines established by the Ministry of Education and the Board of Education. The principal of the school, in consultation with the District staff, school staff, students, and the Parent Advisory Council, is responsible for determining the date of the public dedication ceremony.
- Invitations to the public dedication ceremony shall be issued to all current trustees and former trustees who can be contacted.

Dear Committee on naming the Lake Country middle school,

The Lake Country Heritage and Cultural Society (LCHCS) would like to nominate Eijiro Koyama as the namesake for the new middle school in Lake Country.

Mr. Eijiro Koyama was one of our earliest pioneers and the first Japanese Canadian settler in Lake Country. He arrived in Winfield in 1916, raised a large family, and farmed the land right across Lodge Road from the property on which the middle school will be built. Mr. Koyama passed away in 1956 but his descendants farm the property to this day.

Eijiro Koyama was the acknowledged leader of the Japanese community in the area and his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren continue to contribute to community life in Lake Country. As an example, the Oceola Fish and Game Club named their citizen of the Year Award after his son, Sax Koyama, who also made significant contributions to our community.


From today's perspective we might miss the significance of the Japanese community in Lake Country. However, in the post WWI era, this community, with numerous families in Winfield and Okanagan Centre, was critical to the success of the growing agricultural industry, working as itinerant labourers, as crews and managers for commercial farms such as the Rainbow Ranche, and as owner-operators of market gardens, dairies, and orchards. Socially these families were appreciated as neighbours, classmates, friends and relatives. Historically, they were important threads in the fabric of our community and they remain so today.

The Lake Country Heritage and Cultural Society can think of no more deserving pioneer to acknowledge than Eijiro Koyama and we urge you to name the new middle school after him. The directors are unanimous in making this recommendation.

Eijiro Koyama was born in Matsubara, Shiga-ken, Japan in 1881, the eldest of three children born to Tarosaku and Masa Koyama. He immigrated to Canada at the age of eighteen years and worked at various jobs before moving to the Okanagan in 1903, to work at the Coldstream Ranch. In 1907 Eijiro was promoted to foreman of the Japanese crew and in that capacity he recruited many more young Japanese men to work at the ranch. He established a library, organized sports and when necessary assisted the young men financially. His role as intermediary was significant because these recent immigrants, housed in the Keefer Camp, were unable to speak, read or write English.

In 1908, Eijiro became a naturalized Canadian. Realizing that his future would be in Canada, he made every effort, without the benefit of an ESL course, to learn English. Several quotations following are taken from letters that he wrote to Mr. Wilson, a friend in Japan, on whom he practised his written English.

In 1912, he travelled to Japan where he married Fumi Fujioka, the eldest daughter of a well-to-do, educated family with a samurai background. The couple returned to the Coldstream Ranch where they began their new life with children Kimie and Seichi joining the family in 1914 and 1915.

In the spring of 1916, Eijiro and a few others got together and purchased 20 acres of land on the flats next to W. R. Powley. To move his household from the Coldstream Ranch to the newly purchased land, he borrowed a team of horses named Nip and Tuck from Mr. Powley. Their trip was a two-day journey over the Commonage. The land was all in bush; the first year some clearing was completed, all by hand. As the family worked to establish a self-sustaining farm, various crops were planted, a large barn and silo constructed, and dairy cattle purchased.

By January 26, 1920 Eijiro paid out the other four men on the title to the property, those being

Shuishiro Shoji, Choyoro Hasebe, Ryujiro Numada and Masui Taneda. While working hard to provide for his growing family, he also met his other financial obligations. As well as operating his farm, he worked seasonally in the local fruit packinghouse and at the Rainbow Ranche. By June 9, 1931 he had paid for the farm and he now had a place of his own to raise his young family.

Eijiro Koyama was a busy and humble man who did not have a lot of time to play a visible civic role in the community. However, Eijiro was a founding member and first President of the Koyukai Friends and Fellowship Association formed in 1921. His main reason for starting the Koyukai was to provide a social outlet that would be an alternative for the men who might be tempted by other less desirable activities. The Koyama family played a major role in welcoming new Japanese immigrants to the community, giving numerous young men jobs, a place to stay, and food to eat until they found their place in Canadian society. During the depression he frequently had his daughters make sandwiches for men who would drop by the farm looking for something to eat. This philanthropic community-mindedness earned Eijiro the respect not only of the individuals who he assisted but also of the entire Japanese Canadian community. He was the acknowledged patriarch of the Japanese Canadian community.

Eijiro Koyama was left a single parent with ten children when his wife, Fumi, passed away on February 7th, 1930. He wrote of her "She work hard on earth but good rest with Heavenly Father.... I will be more busy since wife gone, friends great help to me." It was the kindness and generosity of friends and neighbors that allowed him to move forward without his wife and helpmate. Eijiro was quick to reciprocate. From his position of need he practised a life-style of openhearted giving to others. One of his oft-heard phrases was "Be thankful though." He would skillfully turn a negative situation into an opportunity to see the positive and to express gratitude. Eijiro was a man of deep faith with an unwavering trust in God to supply the family's needs. During the Great Depression he wrote, "I am thanks for God blessed us something to eat, something to wear in such hard times."



With a lot of hard work and patience, Eijiro raised a wonderful family. The challenges were many, money was scarce, prices were poor and clothes and shoes needed constant mending and repair. With an adaptable and persevering spirit and a deep love for his family, he took on the sole responsibility and duties of parenting his large family. Eijiro was intent on modeling and teaching by word the time-honoured values of character building - honest hard work, thankfulness, generosity toward those in need, resourcefulness and above all a faith in God. He wrote, "May my child when grow bigger remember what I teaching now." Each of his children would emphatically agree that their father did his best to provide for them and to equip them with the skills needed for life. His grandchildren also attest to their Ojichan either encouraging or teaching as opportunities presented themselves. He told a granddaughter, "I want you to grow up to be an honourable woman. Your parents work hard to provide for you."

The photograph of the Winfield Elementary School class in 1929 illustrates the numerical significance of the Koyama family in Winfield. In 1929 the two eldest Koyama children, Kimie and Seichi, were attending school in Japan, but the next three, Sakuji (Sax), and Tetsuji (Ted), and Harue (Hatch), are shown in this photograph. Younger Koyama children, Junko (Jean), Motoi (Mots), Merry, and Kazuhiko (Kadi) were to follow their siblings at school in the 1930s.

A poem by Merry Koyama Itami captures nicely his life as the father of such a large family.

A Day with Dad on the Farm

As certainly as dawn crept over the hills He was awake. No clock rang by Dad's bed; Only that inner sense of knowing at the barn The cows were waiting to be milked and fed.

But first the kitchen fire was carefully made, Heaped high with wood from the bin beside the door; The huge kettle filled, and placed just so There would be water hot for breakfast time and more.

Upstairs I lay, half dozing, half awake, Knowing that soon I too must face the day; Then footsteps, and the clank of milk pails came And I could hear Dad call, "Wake up! No more delay."

T'was quite the same, some toast of homemade bread, And jam, from prunes that grew across the creek. And milk, and tea, we'd eat together mostly, through the summer's Sunny hours and winters bleak.

The old cream separator's hum, I hear it now, As round and round the boys would daily turn; And from the separator's spouts the streams would flow, Skim milk for calves, and cream for butter's churn.

This chore, twice daily, we the girls would do, To wash and dry the separator parts, Shake out the disks, put up the pails to dry, We did it like all else, with all our hearts.

The fresh turned soil that called for seeding time, And Dad and hired help obeyed the call, With heart and hands and head, bent to the need They toiled, rejoicing as the seeds would fall.

The love of earth, the love of life itself Was in these men who toiled unselfishly; 'Til call to lunchtime came, to break their toil And bring a midday rest, relaxed and free.

Before night milking time, Dad homeward came And laid his tools back in the shed once more. Then off to milk, the cows must know his steps, With pails in hand he tended to this chore.

We filled the bath with water from the creek,
The fire fed with wood we'd gather 'round.
Dad first, the order never changed, we last.
Then on the steps, pick spears his socks had found.

The day near done, bathed, fed, and time for sleep; A little reading rests the weary mind, Some apples from the cellar crispy fresh, Before we leave the toils of day behind.

Day in, day out, the months and years have passed And chapters written thus in Dad's life span Have yielded life itself to us who come Behind; to do our best, we must, we can.

The little ups and downs we cannot know, And greater things these pioneers of old Faced, solved, and worked to a successful end. We know so little, so much yet untold.

The paths Dad trod, now dim, the footsteps still; But memory lingers strong in us today; We catch the gleam of a silvered brow held high That dared to face the future, come what may.

Eijiro Koyama

In the fall of 1948 Eijiro retired to Mayne Island. Not only did he harvest and prepare sheets of nori (seaweed) but he also bought raw wool from Islanders. After washing, carding, dying and spinning the wool, he knitted many sweaters, socks and toques for family and friends. He had learned to knit from neighbouring ladies while convalescing after breaking his leg while clearing farmland in the early days. A grandson, eleven years old at the time, remembers that he and his sister were invited to visit their grandfather on Mayne Island. What they thought would be a seaside vacation turned into a several-days lesson on how to gather seaweed and prepare it for shipment to Ontario or the Okanagan.

Before his death Eijiro wrote a last letter to his family. The translator described it as "to the point and beautifully written in Japanese." In part the message was "Children, be of one heart… heed this admonition and be moderate."

Thus concluded the full life of this humble man, Eijiro Koyama of Winfield (Lake Country), BC. He passed away on January 17th, 1956. He and Fumi are buried in Winfield.

In that way Eijiro and Fumi live on in each generation that takes the opportunity to emulate their exemplary lives.

Dear Mona:

The Central Okanagan Heritage Society supports the Lake Country Heritage and Cultural Society's nomination of Eijiro Koyama as the namesake for the new middle school in Lake Country. The naming of the school after Mr. Eijiro Koyama will not only honour this wonderful man who contributed so much to the community's early years, but will also recognize the role that the Japanese Canadian community played in the development of the District of Lake Country.

The Japanese Canadian community in Lake Country was established in the early 1900s, as workers came to the Okanagan to plant new orchards. These pioneers arriving in the Okanagan, often from other areas of British Columbia, were young single men intending to work in Canada for a few years and then return to Japan. They brought with them many skills and a strong work ethic, and they contributed a great deal to the success of the early orchards. Their experiences in the Okanagan along with the beauty of the Lake Country region convinced many to stay and to build a life here.

Eijiro Koyama of Shiga-ken immigrated to Canada in 1899, at the age of eighteen. He worked first as a commercial fisherman on the coast and for the railway. In 1904, he moved to Vernon to work at the Coldstream Ranch and he eventually became the ranch foreman. On September 15th, 1908 in Vernon, Eijiro Koyama became a naturalized Canadian. He married Fumi Fujioka in 1912 and their first child, daughter Kimie, was born in 1914, followed by son Seichi in 1915. With a growing family, Eijiro and Fumi decided to move to Winfield, then known as Wood Lake, where they purchased twenty acres of land. Their new neighbour, Mr. W. R. Powley, lent Eijiro a team of horses, 'Nip' and 'Tuck', to move his family from the Coldstream Ranch to Winfield, which took two days over dirt roads. The Koyama's first home was a small lean-to building. In the 1920s, they added a barn and silo for the herd of dairy cows, raised hogs and chickens, and farmed vegetables to help the family become self-sufficient. Outgrowing their first rough-hewn home, the Koyama family moved across the creek to the larger house which still stands today. Eijiro Koyama continued dairy farming until his retirement in 1951.

Eijiro was a founding member and first President of the Koyukai Friends and Fellowship Association formed in 1921. The Koyama family played a major role in welcoming new Japanese immigrants to the community, giving numerous young men jobs, a place to stay, and food to eat until they found their place in Canadian society. During the depression, he frequently had his daughters make sandwiches for men who would drop by the farm looking for something to eat. This philanthropic community-mindedness earned Eijiro the respect not only of the individuals who he assisted but also of the entire Japanese Canadian community. He was the acknowledged patriarch of the Japanese Canadian community. Eijiro Koyama sadly passed away on January 17th, 1956. Both Eijiro and his wife Fumi are buried in the Winfield Cemetery.

The story of these early settlers and their courage in meeting the daily challenges of life in a new land is an important part of Lake Country's history. Numerous descendants of Eijiro and Fumi still reside in Lake Country and the family home still stands at Lodge Road in Winfield.

Thank you for considering the Lake Country Heritage and Cultural Society's request to honour this important pioneer by naming the new middle school after him. Please feel free to contact me if you have questions or would like more information.

Action: Trustee Stipend - Proposed Change Due to Elimination of Non

Taxable Allowance

1.0 BACKGROUND

Prior to 2019, an exemption was available to certain individuals for a non-accountable allowance that was paid to cover expenses connected with carrying out work-related duties. This non-accountable allowance was excluded from income unless it exceeds one-half of the individual's salary and other remuneration.

The exemption was available for:

- Elected members of provincial and territorial legislative assemblies and officers of incorporated municipalities;
- Officers, elected by popular vote, of municipal utilities boards, commissions, corporations, or similar bodies; and
- Members of public or separate school boards, or of similar bodies governing a school district.

Effective January 1, 2019, non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals will be fully included in income.

The government stated that the current exemption for non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals provides an unfair advantage over other Canadians (Appendix A). For this reason, Budget 2017 announced that these non-accountable allowances will be required to be included as income.

At the November 21, 2018 Finance and Audit Committee meeting, the Committee recommended that the Board of Education approve the increase to the trustee indemnities, effective January 1, 2019, as outlined below in Option #1.

2.0 INFORMATION STATEMENT

In order to provide relevant, comparable information to the Board, staff conducted an informal survey of other comparable sized districts and local municipalities to confirm how they plan to address the elimination of the non-accountable allowance paid to elected officials. See Appendix B for a summary of additional District's responses.

Districts

School District #41 Burnaby

The newly elected board have not yet made a decision on this topic. District contact stated the board will most likely gross up salaries by 20-23% to offset the additional tax burden.

School District #34 Abbotsford

The newly elected board have not yet made a decision on this topic.

School District #43 Coquitlam

This district is unique in that trustee remuneration is tied directly to municipal council remuneration. Where municipality increases their council remuneration, trustee remuneration is automatically adjusted.

School District #73 – Kamloops/Thompson

The newly elected board have not yet made a decision on this topic.

Municipalities

City of Kelowna

Based on recommendations set forth in May 2018, effective January 1, 2019 there will be an 11% (\$11,830) increase to the mayor's annual pay and a 9% (3,050) increase to each Councilor.

City of West Kelowna

No information provided at this time.

City of Vernon

Based on recommendations of the Council Remuneration Committee, effective January 1, 2019, the mayor and council will receive an 11% increase to offset the federal policy change.

OPTIONS TO CONSIDER

Two options available to trustees include:

1. Adjust trustee gross pay so net pay remains unchanged. Total annual cost to the District is approximately \$12,799;

- 2. Leave trustee gross pay as is and continue to reimburse certain expenses as per Policy 190 Trustee Expenses (Appendix C). Further expenses that may be covered include, but are not limited to:
 - Additional vehicle insurance
 - Expenses related to "home office" (i.e.: printers and printing supplies, utilities, maintenance, internet connections
 - Monthly fees relating to mobile or wireless device

Currently, trustees are reimbursed for reasonable in district travel at the current BC School Trustee Association rate that also corresponds to the Canada Revenue Agency rate.

What you need to know: Changes to the Non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers, and members of public or separate school boards

OTTAWA, Sept. 25, 2018 /CNW/ - For 2019 and subsequent tax years, non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals will be fully included in income.

This change is part of the Government of Canada's plan to make sure all taxpayers pay their share. It was announced in Budget 2017 and will start in 2019 and continue in subsequent tax years.

This change will help ensure that similar kinds of income are treated consistently.

If you are directly affected, the information below will give you a better idea of what the change means for you.

Non-accountable allowances for income tax purposes

Generally, a non-accountable allowance paid to an individual for work-related expenses is considered a taxable benefit and is included as income for tax purposes. An allowance is considered non-accountable if the individual does not have to provide details or submit receipts to justify the amount they paid.

Understanding the current exemption for non-accountable allowances

Prior to 2019, an exemption is available to certain individuals for a non-accountable allowance that is paid to cover expenses connected with carrying out work-related duties. This non-accountable allowance is excluded from income unless it exceeds one-half of the individual's salary and other remuneration.

If the non-accountable allowance paid exceeds one-half of the individual's salary and other remuneration, the excess amount is a taxable benefit and included as income.

The exemption is available for:

- · elected members of provincial and territorial legislative assemblies and officers of incorporated municipalities;
- · officers, elected by popular vote, of municipal utilities boards, commissions, corporations, or similar bodies: and
- · members of public or separate school boards, or of similar bodies governing a school district.

Understanding the changes to non-accountable allowances

For 2019 and subsequent tax years, non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals will be fully included in income.

Why this change was made

The current exemption for non-accountable allowances paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals provides an unfair advantage over other Canadians. For this reason, Budget 2017 announced that these non-accountable allowances will be required to be included as income.

Additional information on this change can be found in Tax Measures: Supplementary Information published with Budget 2017.

Making sure organizations have time to prepare

In order to provide affected organizations sufficient time to adjust their compensation schemes, Budget 2017 announced that this measure will apply to the 2019 and subsequent tax years.

Changes for employers

Currently in order to complete the employee's T4 slip, an employer must identify both the taxable and exempt share of the allowance when a non-accountable allowance is paid to elected members of legislative assemblies, certain municipal officers and certain other individuals. The amounts are distinguished because only the taxable share is reported in box 14, "Employment income," and subject to income tax and Canada Pension Plan (CPP) deductions at source.

For 2019 and subsequent tax years, the full amount of the allowance will be included in box 14 and subject to income tax and CPP deductions at source. Generally, amounts paid to elected or appointed officials are not subject to employment insurance premiums.

The input tax credit or partial GST/HST rebate for employers

Where an employer pays an allowance to an employee, an input tax credit or a partial GST/HST rebate may be available. For more information, see GST/HST memorandum 9-3, Allowances.

We are currently reviewing how this change will affect GST/HST Policy Statement P 097R2, Expense allowances of elected municipal officers and school board members.

190 – TRUSTEE EXPENSES

Introduction

Trustees will be reimbursed, as outlined in this policy, for costs incurred in performing their duties.

In order to enable trustees to gain greater knowledge and experience relative to their responsibilities, the Board of Education supports their attendance at appropriate conventions, seminars and courses within the budget limitations established by the Board.

Expense claims will be submitted recognizing the fundamental principle that expenses paid from public funds have been incurred prudently and meet the test of appropriateness and reasonableness.

1. Board Business

a) In-District Expenses

Each year a budget shall be set to cover in-district expenses.

The following expenses shall be covered by the one-third tax-free indemnity expense allowance:

- i) additional vehicle insurance;
- ii) annual credit card fees and credit card interest:
- iii) expenses related to the creation of a 'home office' (e.g. printers and printing supplies, utilities, maintenance, internet connection);
- iv) monthly fees relating to any mobile or wireless device.

Actual reasonable costs for travel for in-district Board business may be claimed at the current BC School Trustees Association's rate but shall not exceed the acceptable reimbursement rate established by the Revenue Canada Agency.

Trustees may request reimbursement for Board business telephone calls and meals for other people, when on official Board business. Receipts are to be provided.

The School District will only provide office supplies to assist trustees directly in their duties (e.g. School District e-mail account, office stationery).

Once a term, if requested, a trustee will be provided with a mobile or wireless device. Any provided device must be returned to the School District when the trustee's term ends or he/she discontinues using the device for School District business.

The Board Chair will be supplied a basic cell phone to conduct board business.

b) Conferences, Seminars, and Workshops

Each year, a budget shall be set for the costs of trustees attending the BC School Trustees Association (BCSTA) Annual General Meeting, the BC Public School Employers' Association (BCPSEA) Annual General Meeting, the BCSTA Trustee Academies and BCSTA Branch meetings. Trustees who are claiming expenses directly from the organization will not claim expenses under this section.

c) Other Expenses

Authorized miscellaneous expenses must be claimed using a Cheque Requisition Form, with appropriate receipts attached.

2. Trustee Personal Travel/Seminar Budget

- 2.1 A separate budget shall be set annually and each trustee shall be allocated 1/7 of this budget.
- 2.2 Within this budget allocation, trustees may each choose to attend the conferences, annual general meetings or seminars which they deem to be beneficial to their duties.
- 2.3 In the year of trustee elections, trustees will receive a maximum of 5/12 of their annual personal travel budget to November 30. The remaining 7/12 shall be retained for the new Board.
- 2.4 Trustees may carry forward, from year to year, a surplus in their travel budget, to a maximum of four year's annual allocation, to enable them to attend distant conferences.

- 2.5 A trustee may carry forward, from year to year, a deficit in his/her travel budget, provided this is eliminated by the trustee on the completion of his/her term.
- 2.6 After attending conferences, seminars or workshops at Board expense, trustees shall submit a report to the Board, if requested.

3. Travel Outside of the Central Okanagan (whether on Board business or using personal budget)

- 3.1 The per kilometre reimbursement rate will be the same rate as determined by the BCSTA but shall not exceed the acceptable reimbursement rate established by the Revenue Canada Agency.
- 3.2 All out-of-valley travel to destinations other than the Fraser Valley, Lower Mainland or Victoria will be reimbursed at the lower of the per kilometer rate or the lowest airfare rate available at the time of travel when air transportation is available and practical.
- 3.3 The amount to be reimbursed for automobile travel to the Fraser Valley and the Lower Mainland shall be reimbursed at the rate established by the Board of Education.
- 3.4 For purposes of this policy, the 'Fraser Valley' is defined as being within the boundaries of the following school districts:
 - School District No. 33 (Chilliwack), School District No. 34 (Abbotsford), School District No. 75 (Mission) and School District No. 78 (Fraser-Cascade).
- 3.5 For purposes of this policy the 'Lower Mainland' is defined as being within the boundaries of the following school districts:

School District No. 35 (Langley), School District No. 36 (Surrey), School District No. 37 (Delta), School District No. 38 (Richmond), School District No. 39 (Vancouver), School District No. 40 (New Westminster), School District No. 41 (Burnaby), School District No. 42 (Maple Ridge-Pitt Meadows), School District No. 43 (Coquitlam), School District No. 44 (North Vancouver), and School District No. 45 (West Vancouver).

- 3.6 Automobile travel to Victoria will be reimbursed at the rate established by the Board of Education (including ferry costs).
- 3.7 Trustees may claim for taxis, parking fees, local mileage and airport improvement fees. Receipts are to be provided (except for local mileage).

Lodging

- 3.8 Accommodation may be claimed based on the 'single' rate of the convention hotel or on the standard government approved rate. Hotel charges such as valet service, personal telephone calls and in-room movies are the responsibility of the trustee.
- 3.9 If staying with a friend or relative, \$30.00 per night may be claimed without a receipt.
- 3.10 The cost of extra nights is the responsibility of the trustee.

Meals

3.11 For meals not covered by the convention fees, trustees may claim the BCSTA per diem rate in effect at the time for actual meals.

4. Payment of Expenses

- 4.1 Expenses must be submitted on a timely basis, preferably once a month. Only expenses submitted on the correct forms shall be considered. Expense claims that are submitted three months after the occurrence of the event or expense will not be paid unless approved by the Board.
- 4.2 Trustees may request an advance for out-of-town business engagements of two or more days.
- 4.3 The Superintendent, or designate, shall scrutinize each trustee expense claim. The Board shall resolve any discrepancy in interpreting and applying this policy.

5. Expenses Paid by Outside Organizations

5.1 Trustees who are elected or appointed by the Board to officially represent the Board of Education at provincial meetings of the BCSTA Provincial Council or the BC Public Schools Employers' Association Representative

Council or serving on BCSTA, BCPSEA, or Ministry of Education committees, will be compensated by those organizations in accordance with their expense policies. Trustees are responsible for claiming expenses directly from those organizations and will not be reimbursed by the Board.

6. Review of Trustee Expenses

Bi-annually, a sub-committee comprising of the Board Chair, Vice-Chair and the Finance and Legal Committee Chair, shall review all Trustee Expenses for the previous 6 months. The sub-committee shall make recommendations to the Board regarding changes to Policy or practice.

Action Item: Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool

1.0 ISSUE STATEMENT

The Central Okanagan Public Schools Early Learning Team has been working alongside the Suxkenxitluk kl cecamala ("those who care for the children") Aboriginal Early Years Table and, together, have been exploring ways to enhance transitions for families in more culturally responsive and culturally safe ways. As part of this work together, the Métis Society put forward a proposal to the Aboriginal Head Start Association of BC (AHSABC) to fund an Urban Aboriginal Head Start program in the Rutland area (to be named Awasisak Achakos Head Start). With "agreement in principle" in place from the AHSABC, the Métis Society is seeking a location within the Rutland area. As such, the Métis Society has proposed to partner with the Board of Education to establish an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool Program on an elementary school site in Rutland. All costs and funding for this proposed early years project will be the sole responsibility of AHSABC in partnership with the Métis Society.

2.0 RELEVANT BOARD MOTION/DIRECTION

As per <u>Board Policy 701 – Early Years Partnerships</u> (see Appendix A), the Board of Education recognizes the importance of the early years and the shared responsibilities in ensuring a safe and optimal transition from home to school for our earliest learners. The Board of Education believes that certain opportunities which provide for partnerships between the community and schools are beneficial to student success. Partnerships which enhance the preschool years and support all facets of early learning development (social, emotional, physical, creative, and intellectual development) are important to the Board.

At the October 24, 2018 Public Board Meeting, the following was passed:

18P-136

THAT: The Board of Education support, in principle, the Partnership Proposal to build an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool on site at either South Rutland Elementary School or Springvalley Elementary School, as attached to the Agenda and as presented at the October 24, 2018 Public Board Meeting.

3.0 BACKGROUND

The Aboriginal Head Start in Urban and Northern Communities (AHSUNC) Program, created in 1995, is a national community-based early intervention program. The program targets three distinct groups of Indigenous people living in urban and northern communities: First Nations, Métis and Inuit. In recent years, the program reach has ranged from 4600-4800 children annually at 134 sites across Canada.

This Aboriginal Head Start off-reserve program aims to enhance child development and school readiness of Indigenous children. The program provides no-fee child care, which is complemented by other programs and supports such as programs for parent education and supports for inclusion of children with special needs. Indigenous community organizations design and deliver holistic programs to enhance the spiritual, emotional, physical and social wellbeing of Indigenous children aged 0-6 and their families while supporting their parents and guardians as their primary teachers.

AHSUNC sites typically provide programs for Indigenous children (3-5 years of age) focused on six program components: Indigenous culture and language; education and school readiness; health promotion; nutrition; social support; and parental involvement.

These are intended to work holistically to support Indigenous children's early childhood development and well-being, and prepare them for a successful transition to school.

At the November 21, 2018 Planning and Facilities Committee Meeting, the Committee recommended that the Board of Education grant approval to the Métis Society to build an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool at South Rutland Elementary School.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION


At the October 17th, 2018 Planning and Facilities Meeting, the Committee recommended that the Métis Society and staff consult with parents/caregivers of Indigenous preschoolers to consider the viability of locating the Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool at either Springvalley Elementary School or South Rutland Elementary School.

The Métis Society provided an overview of the Urban Aboriginal Head Start Program to the Springvalley Parent Advisory Council on Wednesday, November 7, 2018 and presented to the South Rutland Parent Advisory Council on Thursday, November 8, 2018. Over 12 parents were present at each meeting. On November 13, 2018, a forum was held at Rutland Secondary, providing an opportunity to discuss the proposed program and viability of each school site. Members of the Rutland community were also invited to provide their feedback through an online survey posted on the District and Rutland schools' websites.

Over 50 parents responded to the on-line survey. An analysis of the data reflected support for both school sites.

Parent Responses Received from Rutland Schools

1. Please indicate the Rutland school in which your child(ren) attend:



Staff have concluded that South Rutland Elementary and Springvalley Elementary meet the criteria for community need, accessibility, as well as, site/facility space. Both schools welcome the opportunity to partner with the Urban Aboriginal Head Start program. Both school sites are relatively flat and accessible. Utilities are accessible for water, sewer, gas, and power at each school site. However, both school sites will need to plan for additional parking and traffic flow.

It should also be noted that Quigley Elementary School and Pearson Road Elementary School currently have early learning programs being offered that serve Aboriginal children and families.





At South Rutland Elementary School, the proposed location:

- is closer to the gym and school access; and
- is farther away from the school parking lot.
- Utility work would be slightly more involved, requiring some additional site prep.

At Springvalley Elementary School, the proposed location:

- is closer to the parking lot;
- requires a paved/concrete walkway to access the facility;
- requires the relocation of the existing portable at Springvalley Elementary to be relocated to Springvalley Middle School, providing this space for the Urban Aboriginal Head Start Program.

In addition to receiving feedback on the preferred location of the Urban Aboriginal Head Start Program, the majority of parents strongly supported the concept of an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Program and expressed interest in enrolling their preschool child/children. However, some parents expressed concern with possible overcrowding, transportation issues, location of the portable infringing on playground space, parking, and exclusivity of the program.

Although South Rutland Elementary School and Springvalley Elementary School sites are both viable options for placement of an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Program, staff recommend placement at South Rutland Elementary School as there are minimal preschool options in Central Rutland. Additionally, the South Rutland Elementary School site requires less initial site preparation.

5.0 OPTIONS FOR ACTION

- 5.1 Support the recommendation.
- 5.2 Select a different site for placement of the Urban Aboriginal HeadStart Preschool.
- 5.3 Request additional information.

6.0 SECRETARY-TREASURER/CFO'S COMMENTS

Offering support through a dedicated site to an Urban Aboriginal Head Start program enables us to further expand the Preschool offerings in our community. These Partnerships have played a significant role in enhancing the preschool years and supporting early learning development.

7.0 RECOMMENDATION

THAT: The Board of Education grant approval to the Métis Society to build an Urban Aboriginal Head Start Preschool at South Rutland Elementary School.

701 – EARLY YEARS PARTNERSHIPS

Introduction

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of the early years and the shared responsibilities in ensuring a safe and optimal transition from home to school for our earliest learners.

The Board of Education believes that certain opportunities which provide for partnerships between the community and schools are beneficial to student success. Partnerships which enhance the preschool years and support all facets of early learning development (social, emotional, physical, creative and intellectual development) are important to the Board.

The Board defines Early Years as 0-8 years of age in accordance with the National Association for Education of Young Children's (NAEYC) definition of early childhood.

Policy

The Board has established an Early Years Partnership Committee which includes trustees, parents, teachers, principals/vice-principals, district staff, child advocacy agencies, and health and childcare providers. The committee's mandate is to promote and coordinate the ongoing expansion of early childhood opportunities (including daycare, preschool, StrongStart, and out of school care), in adherence with Board of Education policies and procedures.

1. Guiding Principles

The Board of Education believes in the importance of:

1.1 Accessibility of early childhood care and learning for families Early Years Partnerships will:

- promote low-cost space to operators for program operation
- ensure that fair and discreet processes are in place to enable the attendance of preschoolers from low-income families through subsidy provided by the early childhood care operator at a rate established by the Board of Education
- monitor available space within schools for early childhood opportunities

1.2 Well-supported transitions from home to school

Early Years Partnerships will:

• support the Early Years Centre models so that community services can be connected to all families, recognizing the distinct needs of Aboriginal families as well as families from culturally diverse backgrounds

3.0 BACKGROUND

Early in 2018, the District started construction on Canyon Falls Middle School in the OK Mission Family of Schools. This middle school will be the only middle school in the Mission area and is targeted to open September 2019. Okanagan Mission family of schools consists of

three elementary schools and one secondary school The opening of Canyon Falls Middle School will allow this family of schools to implement the District grade configuration of K-5, 6-8 and 9-12.

Prior to the opening of registration in February 2019 for Canyon Falls Middle School, the District needs to establish a catchment boundary for the middle school. Canyon Falls Middle School will serve the Okanagan Mission area which is similar to Okanagan Mission Secondary School. The elementary schools will feed into the middle school which will feed into the Okanagan Mission Secondary School for the area. Since the middle school will serve the Mission area, the recommended boundary should be the same as the secondary school. As the current secondary school catchment accommodates grade 7 and 8 students, the same catchment should be consistent for the new middle school. Appendix A shows the proposed catchment boundary.

November 21, 2018 Planning and Facilities Committee Meeting Outcome:

The Committee recommended that the Board of Education approve the establishment of a middle school catchment boundary for Canyon Falls Middle School as presented at the Planning and Facilities Committee on November 21, 2018.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

- 1. The establishment of the boundary does not impact the Okanagan Mission family of schools
- 2. Creating catchment boundaries will help manage student enrolment in the schools
- 3. Transportation eligibility is consistent with policy and regulations
- 4. The District recognizes that there is growing pressure for space, particularly within the Glenmore Corridor and it's feeder schools. The District's Long Term Facility Plan is scheduled for review this fall and winter. As a part of that review, catchment boundaries in the Okanagan Mission schools will be reevaluated to determine the potential for alleviating some of this pressure. Based on the discussions, growth pressures, capacity issues, some catchment boundaries for schools may need to be amended.

5.0 OPTIONS FOR ACTION

- 1. Approve the recommended catchment boundary as presented.
- 2. Provide alternate direction to staff.

6.0 DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS

This will establish the new catchment boundary for Canyon Falls Middle School and allow for appropriate boundaries to be utilized for transportation.

7.0 RECOMMENDATION



3.0 BACKGROUND

The Board of Education approved a catchment review for Bankhead Elementary and Watson Road Elementary schools this past September, to explore boundary options for the schools that would best follow road centrelines and property boundaries.

School District staff members have reviewed the demographics, future growth projections and facilities' capacities, as well as attended Parent Advisory Council meetings at these schools and Glenmore Elementary School to introduce the catchment area review and listen to parental input for consideration.

During the Parent Advisory Committee meetings Staff heard consistent messaging:

- Keeping neighbourhoods and peers together is important
- Keeping families together is important
- Ensuring the schools are sustainable for the long-term
- Provide transportation certainty was understandable for the School District



Catchment Boundary Review

Bankhead Elementary and Watson Road Elementary Schools

School District staff presented to the Planning and Facilities (P&F) Committee, with recommendations, the process for review of Bankhead Elementary and Watson Road Elementary Catchment Areas. Recently a new subdivision was created around the Highpointe Drive and Clifton Road area. The current Bankhead Elementary and Watson Elementary catchment boundary splits the subdivision and in some cases the boundary splits individual properties which creates uncertainty when registering for an elementary school

A catchment review is to be a collaborative process to minimize disruptions to families, make the most effective use of existing facilities, provide certainty for transportation eligibility and create sustainable enrolment levels in these elementary schools. The (P&F) Committee recommended that the Board of Education proceed with the Catchment review for Bankhead and Watson Road Elementary Schools.

SD23 has established policies (Policy 405 and 405R) for setting/changing catchment areas. The following are the principles to follow for catchment review:

- reflect traditional neighbourhoods, subdivisions and regions;
- minimize safety concerns for elementary students as a result of major roadways or other known hazards;
- reflect long-term development to minimize stress caused by frequently changing boundaries in rapidly growing/declining areas;
- maximize the efficiency of schools and the transportation system;
- maintain a cohort of students at each grade level offered at the school, to support the long-term sustainability of the school.

The timeline for this catchment review started in September with the development of some options for this area. Presentations were made at Parent Advisory Committee meetings and the staff are expecting to provide a recommendation to the Board in November/December. Any changes to the catchment boundaries, if approved by the Board, will be implemented for September 2019.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What types of changes can be proposed?

The types of changes that could be proposed include:

- changes to school boundaries (the catchment area for a school could change)
- 2. What are the issues in my community?

The shared catchment boundary for Bankhead Elementary School and Watson Road Elementary School divides a subdivision off Highpointe Drive that impacts the neighbourhood that includes Boynton Place, Traditions Crescent and Sladen Circle. The catchment review is to redraw the boundary that would not divide properties but following along streets or property lines.

3. When will these changes come into effect?

The proposed recommendation would come forward to the Planning and Facilities Committee meeting in November/December and moved forward to a public Board of Trustees meeting. If approved by the Board, the implementation for any change would be for September 2019.

4. What will come forward to the Planning and Facilities Committee for review?

The way the catchment boundary review process works, staff must develop a proposed plan detailing changes affecting schools in the review area. At this time, it is a proposed plan for change. That proposal is subject to consultation. After the consultation process, staff will make recommendations to the Planning and Facilities Committee and the committee will vote on those recommendations. The recommendations of the committee then go to Board for final approval.

5. What will happen to students if these changes are made?

The impact on students depends on the proposed change at the school. Every effort has been made to keep student cohorts together.

6. How can parents and guardians get involved?

Parents, guardians, students and community members will have an opportunity to learn more about the recommended plan and to provide feedback in the fall. This will occur in several ways, including:

- Attending a Parent Advisory Committee meeting;
- Provide written input to <u>Planning.Review@sd23.bc.ca</u>
- Attending a Planning and Facilities Committee or Board meeting.
- 7. What students will have to move from one school to another? Can all existing students remain in their current school?

Students who are in their current school this current year will continue to stay in the school until they move to middle school. If the catchment boundary is approved for September 2019, any new students applying to the school will be placed in priority based on Policy 405.

8. Will siblings have to attend different schools?

The Board of Education policy places a high priority on keeping siblings together, and the intent is to allow siblings to stay together if that is what families decide to do. Any changes that are recommended are to cause the least disruption to families in the area. Here are two examples of unique circumstances, which demonstrate how siblings could stay together:

- **Scenario 1:** Both siblings attend Bankhead Elementary School but are now in catchment for Watson Elementary School. The students are able to stay in the school until they are able to move to the middle school.

Elementary Schools

1.0 ISSUE STATEMENT

During the Board meeting regarding the transportation funding in September 2016, there was discussion regarding re-establishing the elementary boundaries in the Rutland area. Currently, this area has an open elementary catchment boundary. Direction from the Board was to hold off on establishing the Rutland proper area until there is a decision on the Rutland Middle School; however, the boundaries for Black Mountain and Ellison Elementary schools could move forward because they are distinct communities and the busing eligibility is based on having catchments.

2.0 RELEVANT BOARD MOTION/DIRECTION

Main Motion 18P-102 as Amended by 18P-103

THAT: Staff proceed with a Catchment Area Review for Black Mountain Elementary and Ellison Elementary Schools.

CARRIED

3.0 BACKGROUND

The development of the Long Term Facility Plan recommended to establish catchment boundary's for Black Mountain Elementary and Ellison Elementary Schools for two reasons:

- 1) Provide certainty regarding transportation eligibility and
- 2) Manage student enrolment for Black Mountain Elementary due to the projected growth in the Black Mountain area

The Board of Education approved a catchment review for Black Mountain and Ellison Elementary schools in September 2018, to explore boundary options for the schools.

School District staff members have reviewed the demographics, future growth projections and School capacities, as well as attended Parent Advisory Council meetings at these schools to introduce the catchment area review and listen to parental input for consideration.

During the Parent Advisory Committee meetings Staff heard consistent messaging:

- Keeping neighbourhoods and peers together is important
- Keeping families together is important
- Ensuring the schools are sustainable for the long-term
- Provide transportation certainty for schools and families was understandable for the School District

Staff received some comments from Black Mountain Elementary School parents regarding the draft boundary along Lewis Road and Garner Road and consideration to exclude the Toovey Neighbourhood from a Black Mountain Elementary catchment boundary. The summary of the comments and responses are provided in Appendix D.

Staff have not received any correspondence from parents in Ellison Elementary School.

November 21, 2018 Planning and Facilities Committee Meeting Outcome:

The Committee recommended that the Board approve Option #3 (include Toovey Heights and Charleswood Drive areas) for Black Mountain Elementary School catchment boundary as presented at the Planning and Facilities Committee on November 21, 2018.

In addition, the Committee recommended that the Board approve Option #1 for Ellison Elementary School catchment boundary as presented at the Planning and Facilities Committee on November 21, 2018.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

- 1. Creating catchment boundaries will help manage student enrolment in the schools
- 2. Transportation eligibility is consistent with policy and regulations
- 3. Current enrolment projections indicate Black Mountain Elementary will continue to exceed its capacity over the next ten years; enrolment projected to increase to 460 over the next ten years
- 4. Black Mountain Elementary School will require one or two portables to accommodate current projections
- 5. The historic kindergarten registrations for Black Mountain Elementary School have averaged about 70 students. The kindergarten projection for 2019 shows an increase over the average to 83. This increases the pressure on the school capacity; however, this is an anomaly and projections from 2020 forward, expects the kindergarten registrations to move back to the historic trend.
- 6. Black Mountain area continues to have higher migration rate of children moving into the area.
- 7. Toovey Heights Neighbourhood
 - a. Include Toovey Heights Neighbourhood with Black Mountain Elementary Catchment
 - Majority of families in the neighbourhood (27 students 2018 Enrolment) currently attend Black Mountain Elementary School. The area averages 20 students attending Black Mountain Elementary over the last five years.

- Siblings of current students not yet registered will attend Black Mountain Elementary School to keep families together
- The neighbourhood over the last four years has averaged about twenty students attending Black Mountain Elementary
- The Rutland Area is an open catchment that allows families to choose which school to attend. In the Toovey Heights neighbourhood families have chosen Black Mountain Elementary school to register their children and have accepted the school being over capacity compared to other Rutland schools that are under capacity
- b. Exclude Toovey Heights Neighbourhood from Black Mountain Elementary Catchment
 - Current students can remain at Black Mountain Elementary school
 - Siblings of current students registering for September 2019 or later will be subject to the student placement policy 405. However, the Board may suspend this policy to accommodate siblings of current students.
 - The exclusion of this are from Black Mountain Elementary may reduce the student projections for the school to the current enrolment levels. This would not occur immediately; however, over time the projections may decrease by removing the historical trend of number of students over time.
 - There are other schools in Rutland area that have room in the schools for more students
 - Enrolment projections for Black Mountain Elementary show a small decrease in enrolment by excluding this neighbourhood; however, the school will still require additional portables regardless of whether Toovey Heights students are included or excluded. Toovey Heights students could be accommodated in the short term without disruption.

5.0 OPTIONS FOR ACTION

- 1. Recommend that the Board of Education approve the catchment boundary changes as presented;
- 2. Provide additional or different direction

6.0 SECRETARY TREASURER'S COMMENTS

Establishing the catchments for Black Mountain and Ellison Elementary as presented will re-establish distinct catchments for each school and allow for appropriate boundaries to be utilized for transportation.



Projections

There are two feeding streams for elementary schools moving to the two middle schools. The Elementary Schools of Ellison, Pearson Rd, Rutland and South Rutland feeding into Rutland Middle School and the Elementary Schools of Belgo, Black Mountain, Quigley and Springvalley feeding into Springvalley Middle School.

When projections are developed for catchment changes, the number of students impacted for a change are removed from the school and placed in the next catchment area school; however, since the next catchment area in this exercise is an open catchment, it can not be assumed the students would be placed in the closest school. Assumptions are made for the student placement in schools. Specifically for the Toovey Neighbourhood, average number of students going to Black Mountain Elementary over the last five years is about 20 students. There has been a high of 26 students and a low


of 13 students attending Black Mountain. Other elementary students in this area are also attending Quigley, Rutland, Springvalley, South Rutland and others throughout the District. Not all students will change schools right away with the new boundary change. Some students will stay in the current school and move through the system. Only new students will be directed to the catchment school; however, the students may choose to go to another school due to the school of choice legislation that allows students the opportunity to register at any school and be accepted depending on space.


In addition, projections also rely on historic retention rates of cohorts moving through the system. Due to growth or decline in cohorts, additions or subtractions, student numbers may not have a change in the projections. Some assumptions made for this exercise were the majority of students will stay in Black Mountain and any new students were moved to the elementary schools that other families in the area attending, Quigley, Rutland, Springvalley and South Rutland. The numbers are also distributed among the grades. There is about four students per grade and as the students are moved through the grades starting in 2019, the impact from the catchment change does not have a significant impact on the projected enrolments for the middle schools.








Recommended Option for Ellison Elementary





632 – SCHOOL RECONFIGURATIONS

Introduction

The Board of Education supports the long-term goal of phasing in a consistent grade configuration in all areas of the District with K - 5 elementary, Grade 6 - 8 middle and Grade 9 - 12 senior secondary schools.

The timing of changes to the grade configuration structure will be based upon:

- The best needs of the students
- The unique needs of communities within the Central Okanagan Public Schools
- The need to manage growth and the best use of existing school buildings
- Financial considerations
- Extraordinary circumstances

The Board of Education has a responsibility to provide school facilities throughout the school district that will allow for program effectiveness for all students, health and safety of all occupants and operational efficiency. At times, the Board may have to consider alternate configuration options.

Policy

By the last meeting of the Board in November, the Superintendent will present an analysis to the Board on any recommendations for reconfiguration.

1.0 ISSUE STATEMENT

Central Okanagan Public Schools is in the construction phase for Canyon Falls Middle School. The school is scheduled to open September 2019.

2.0 RELEVANT BOARD MOTION/DIRECTION

May 9, 2018

18P-063

THAT: The Board of Education open Canyon Falls Middle School for Grades 6 and 7 students in 2019 for the Okanagan Mission family of schools.

18P-064

THAT: Grade 7 students already in attendance at Okanagan Mission Secondary School, and transitioning into Grade 8, complete their Grade 8 year at Okanagan Mission Secondary School in 2019.

18P-065

THAT: Canyon Falls Middle School will enroll Grade 6, 7 and 8 students in September 2020 and Okanagan Mission Secondary School will become a Grade 9 to 12 school.

3.0 BACKGROUND

To date, consultation has been ongoing with the community. The Board of Education has considered initial grade configurations and final grade configurations for the new Canyon Falls Middle School. Consultation to date has included:

- Assistant Superintendent, Rhonda Ovelson, met with each of the Principals of the affected schools to discuss the initial grade configuration which was approved by the Board of Education on May 9th (Motion 18P-063, 18P-064 and 18P-065.
- School Principals met with their Parent Advisory Councils and forwarded any questions/concerns to the Assistant Superintendent.
- Assistant Superintendent, Vianne Kintzinger, has attended a Parent Advisory Council Meeting at Chute Lake Elementary, Anne McClymont Elementary and Dorothea Walker Elementary to further discuss the grade reconfiguration of the schools in the Okanagan Mission area and to respond to parent questions/concerns.

- A survey was sent to the parents of the affected schools requesting the qualities and characteristics they would like to see in the new Principal at Canyon Falls Middle School.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

Draft New Policy 632 – School Reconfigurations states:

By no later than January, subsequent to agreeing to consider the Superintendent's recommendation, the Board will initiate a process of discussion and consultation with parents, staff and the community. The consultation process shall be in accordance with the attached regulations.

Action Item: Enrollment Application Dates for 2019/2020 School Year

1.0 ISSUE STATEMENT

According to the *School Act*, Section 74.1 (4), Boards of Education are expected to establish an annual process to receive enrollment applications to enroll a person in an educational program. For the 2019/2020 school year, the proposed enrollment application dates are as follows:

Initial Enrollment Application Period:

Monday, February 4, 2019 to Friday, March 15, 2019*

Summer Enrollment Application Period:

Tuesday, August 27, 2019 to Thursday, August 29, 2019**

*The initial enrollment period helps school and district staff to project enrollment numbers and to determine staffing needs for the following year.

**The Board's criteria for acceptance of enrollment applications, giving priority to catchment area students, remains in effect until the closing date of enrollment applications on Thursday, August 29, 2019. After that date, schools may accept applications from 'out-of-catchment' students, space permitting, based on the date and time that the application is received.

Once again this year, an online enrollment application process will be made available to parents to avoid the need for them to line-up at their school of choice.

2.0 RELEVANT BOARD MOTION/DIRECTION

None.

3.0 BACKGROUND

Each year the Central Okanagan Public Schools sets dates for student enrollment applications to facilitate planning for the following September. This is the opportunity for parents to either enroll their children for the first time in Central Okanagan Public Schools, or to submit an application to attend a school of choice (see attached Policy 405 and Regulation 405R – *Student Placement*).

The established dates for the application period are required to assist staff with enrollment priorities as per Board Policy 405 and Regulation 405R - *Student Placement*.

4.0 POINTS FOR CONSIDERATION

Enrollment application information for the Central Okanagan Public Schools will be forwarded to the media as soon as the Board has approved the application dates. School administration will also be publicizing application dates on their school websites, in upcoming school newsletters, and/or on their telephone call-out system. The application dates will be posted on the Central Okanagan Public Schools website as soon as they are approved.

5.0 OPTIONS FOR ACTION

- 1. Approve the recommendation as presented.
- 2. Approve an alternate set of application dates.

6.0 FOLLOW-UP/REVIEW

As soon as the dates for the enrollment application period are established, staff will begin a broad-based information campaign to ensure all parents (school and community) are aware of the specified dates. Central Okanagan Public School staff will also host information meetings to inform parents about the French Immersion Program. The dates of these meetings will be advertised once confirmed.

Schools will also begin planning to facilitate the enrollment application process at each site. Parents will be informed of enrollment application acceptance or wait listings as soon as possible following the close of the enrollment application periods. Out-of-catchment students wishing to enter schools that are close to their capacity, will have to wait until the final close of enrollment applications on August 29, 2019, before finding out if they are able to enroll in the school of their choice.

7.0 SUPERINTENDENT'S COMMENTS

Obtaining as much information regarding future student enrollment, as early as possible, helps both parents and staff plan for the new school year. An initial enrollment application process between February 4th and March 15th will help to ensure that this information is available. Establishing a closing date for the application of the Board's enrollment application priorities of August 29th, ensures that in-catchment students have the maximum opportunity to gain access to their neighbourhood school.

8.0 RECOMMENDATION

THAT: The initial enrollment application dates for the 2019/2020 school year be set as February 4, 2019 through to March 15, 2019;

AND THAT: The closing date of enrollment applications, in order to apply the Board's enrollment application priorities as established in Regulation 405R – *Student Placement (Regulations)*, be set as August 29, 2019.

405 – STUDENT PLACEMENT

Introduction

A student may enroll in an educational program at any school in our district, providing there is space, as outlined by Sections 2(2) and 74.1 of the *School Act*, this Policy and its Regulations.

The Board of Education will designate school catchment areas in the School District in order to:

- meet the program needs of the students as much as possible;
- make the best use of facilities, staff and transportation; and if possible,
- enable the school to develop a unique identity.

Policy

- 1. The principles for setting/changing catchment areas should include the requirement for boundaries to:
 - reflect traditional neighbourhoods, subdivisions and regions;
 - minimize safety concerns for elementary students as a result of major roadways or other known hazards;
 - reflect long-term development to minimize stress caused by frequently changing boundaries in rapidly growing/declining areas;
 - maximize the efficiency of schools and the transportation system;
 - maintain a cohort of students at each grade level offered at the school, to support the long-term sustainability of the school.
- 2. Where space permits, students should be allowed to remain in currently assigned schools and catchment area changes will apply only to new registrations.
- 3. In some situations it may be necessary and desirable to relocate students from one school to another. Except as specified in Board Policy 470 *Transportation Services Management*, students are eligible for School District transport if they are directed to a school beyond the walk limits of their home. The two most common reasons for relocation are capping and reassigning.

- 4. Capping occurs when a school, grade, class or program has reached the capacity as set by the Board. New students wishing to register in a capped school, grade, class or program will be directed to another school. When capping occurs:
 - 4.1 Students who have been directed to another school will have first option, based on a chronological list, of returning to their catchment area school when space becomes available during the year.
 - 4.2 Students will have the option of returning to their catchment area school at the beginning of the new school year if space is available, or remaining at the school to which they were directed.
- 5. Reassigning occurs when a student changes school catchment area as a result of a request by the parent, student or administration.
 - 5.1 A reassignment will be approved if the receiving school, grade or program has space to accommodate the student.
- 6. A student placement decision made by the Superintendent or designate may be appealed to the Board, under Board Policy 460 *Appeals*.

405R – STUDENT PLACEMENT (REGULATIONS)

1. Placement

A student may enrol in an educational program at any school in our district, providing there is space, as outlined in Sections 2(2) and 74.1 of the *School Act*, this Policy and its Regulations, unless they have been directed to another school for any reason as determined by the Superintendent of Schools or designate.

Once a student has been registered in a school, he/she will be counted as a student of that school.

2. Enrolment Priorities

Priority shall be given to students on the following basis:

- catchment area students who, in the previous year, attended the school;
- catchment area students who, in the previous year, were 'placed' by the district in a different school;
- siblings of catchment area students;
- new catchment area students;
- siblings of non-catchment area students currently enrolled in the school;
- non-catchment area students who request to attend the school which is other than their catchment area school;
- non-district area students;
- international students.

The enrolment priorities are applied on a grade by grade basis and are not intended to cause the school to change its grade configuration. Each school is expected to maintain a cohort of students at each grade level offered at the school.

3. Capping

In situations where a grade, class, program or school has reached capacity as set by the Board of Education, capping will be used to relocate students to another school as follows:

3.1 Decisions related to capping will be made by the appropriate area Assistant Superintendent, in consultation with the parent(s)/student, the two Principals involved and the Director of Operations or designate if necessary.

- 3.2 The Assistant Superintendent will provide to the Principals a form letter to communicate to parents the relocation of the student to another school and explaining the procedure.
- 3.3 The home catchment area Principal will place students on a chronological waiting list and will notify the parent(s)/student when space becomes available.
- 3.4 When notified that space is available, parent(s) will have the option of returning the student to the catchment area school, either immediately or at the beginning of the new school year, or have the student remain at the school to which he/she was relocated through capping. If the latter is chosen, the parent(s)/student will be responsible for transportation.

4. Non-Catchment Area Student Registrations

- 4.1 Each year, the Board will establish a formal registration period during which time a parent (or a student who is living independently) may seek to be registered at a school or program outside their catchment area in the following school year. Applications for registration will be considered in accordance with the Enrolment Priorities set out in Section 2 above, provided there is space in the school. Applications received after the formal registration period will be considered in September following the procedures identified in 4.2, 4.3 and 4.4 of these Regulations.
- 4.2 Applications for students from outside the school's catchment area will be placed on a chronological waiting list, based on the date and time the registration is received. After the students from within the catchment area have been placed into classes, non-catchment area students may be accepted into the school from the established Registration Priority waiting list.
- 4.3 The receiving Principal will notify the parent(s) of the acceptance/rejection of the registration and of the student's position on the waiting list by the end of the first week in September.
- 4.4 Once a student is accepted into a school outside of his/her catchment area, siblings of this student will be accepted by established registration priorities and according to space being available.

4.5 Applications for transfers of non-catchment area students who are currently enrolled in the Central Okanagan School District will be considered on a case-by-case basis taking into account the considerations set out in Section 5.1 of these Regulations. Applications for transfers will not be used to circumvent the Enrolment Priorities for non-catchment area student registration in this Section.

5. Reassignment Registrations

- 5.1 A reassignment of a student may occur if it is deemed to be in the best interest of the student and the school, after consultation with the receiving Principal and the parent(s)/student.
- 5.2 The receiving Principal should notify the parent(s)/student of the decision, at the earliest possible date.

6. Transportation

Transportation to attend a school other than the catchment area school shall be the sole responsibility of the parents, as in Board Policy 470 - *Transportation Services Management* unless the student has been directed to attend another school because of capping, or for any other reason as determined by the Superintendent or designate.

7. Appeals

A student placement decision made in accordance with this Policy and Regulations may be appealed to the Board under Board Policy 460 – *Appeals* and Regulations 460.2R – *Appeals Related to Student Placement*.

3.0 BACKGROUND

Recently, staff have discussed the District's School Enhancement requests with the Ministry of Education Capital Branch. School Enhancement program provides funding to improve the safety, facility condition, energy efficiency and functionality of existing schools. Eligible projects include upgrades for electrical, energy efficiency, health and safety, mechanical, washrooms and flooring.

Through discussions with the Ministry, the District was informed that the current projects requested in the 2019/20 Capital Plan submission for School Enhancement cannot be supported due to the size of the projects. Staff was asked to consider projects that will have an approximate cost of \$500,000.

After staff evaluated other projects, it is recommended to add the request to upgrade Mount Boucherie Secondary washrooms. This project is a continuation of the recently completed first phase of washroom upgrades at Mount Boucherie Secondary. The estimated cost for this project is \$590,000.

The Ministry is looking for a response from the District as soon as possible as they continue to work through the Provincial Capital Allocations.

- 2. The Mount Boucherie washroom upgrade could be supported by the Ministry as the cost fits within the allocation they have said is available and is an emergent need.

- 1.5 **Utilize Financial & Capital Assets Prudently**: Draft budget preparation, implementation of the approved budget, effective business administration and management of capital assets.
- 1.6 **Establish Good Public Relations**: High standards of communication, and congenial relations with partner groups and the community.
- 1.7 **Be a Principled Administrator:** A fair, judicious, and ethical Superintendent.
- 1.8 **Be an Exemplary Leader**: Evidence of creativity, decisiveness, and effective problem solving.
- 1.9 **Attend to Personal Wellness**: Set and achieve annual goals to ensure the maintenance of personal health.

2. Additional Specific Duties of the Superintendent are to:

2.1 The Superintendent will, in September of each year, prepare for the Board's consideration, objectives relating to the annual goals. The report will also include recommendations for the improvement of educational and operational services in
